Bahá'ís believe that throughout history, God has sent to humanity a series of Divine Educators whose teachings have provided the basis for the advancement of civilization. These Divine Educators have included Abraham, Buddha, Jesus, Krishna, Moses, Muhammad, and Zoroaster. Bahá'u'lláh, the latest of these Messengers, explained that the religions of the world come from the same Source and are in essence, successive chapters of one religion from God. David Springer was introduced to Bahá'í in 1969 in Mexico City and his life was changed. Today he is an elected leader with Charleston's Bahá'í Spiritual Assembly.
